Watson offers an in depth analysis of these responses and the complications and development of Merleau-Ponty's position.

How do they plan to sustain this decision? And in what ways does probation help? This book explores these questions. The findings indicate that we should allow Probation Officers greater autonomy and discretion within their roles, and that we should free them from the bureaucracy of risk assessment and targets. Moreover, the book warns against the potential fragmentation of community supervision. As such, the book will be of interest to criminology students, researchers, academics, policymakers and practitioners, particularly those who work with ex-offenders in the

community.
